Dear Feet on the Street group.

I see that you have addressed your request directly to the traffic engineers in the Public Works Transportation Services Division, which is the right place to go. I am hereby adding my voice to the request that they examine the speed and safety issues that you raise concerning the length of Lakeshore Avenue next to the Lake. (Which is actually in Council member McElhaney's district, but I drive it frequently.) I want to let you know, however, that there are unlikely to be any "quick fixes." It takes time for them to evaluate both the existing issues and possible solutions. Regarding the "rumble strips" or "bot dots", there are pros and cons to doing that. The dots that I am familiar with are quite noisy when cars go over them and thus nearby neighbors usually object to them. It may also be an issue with the buses that use Lakeshore. In any case, the engineers are prepared to do the required analysis of all the issues.

Subject: Update and Response to: Lake Merritt/Grand Lack of Crosswalk Safety Concerns

To our Concerned Citizens in the Grand-Lake, Adams Point and neighboring communities:

Recently, in a span of two months, two auto-pedestrian collisions occurred at the intersection of Grand Avenue and Bellevue Avenue that resulted in the deaths of two pedestrians. The first incident took place on Oct 12, 2012 when a pedestrian walking in the marked crosswalk across Grand Avenue was struck by a car. Although the pedestrian was released from the hospital, he died days later. The second incident occurred on Dec 17, 2012 when a couple was crossing Grand Avenue in the same marked crosswalk. They were both stuck by a car and seriously injured. The female victim died as a result of her injuries.

Our staff in Transportation Services Division met with the OPD Traffic Investigations Unit officers to discuss the details of the collisions. From their preliminary investigation, they conclude that the first incident was caused by driver inattention and the second incident was caused by driver inattention and lighting conditions (the incident took place early in the evening after sundown). Both drivers did not appear to attempt to stop before their vehicles collided with the pedestrians. In the aftermath of the incidents, we received emails from the community requesting safety enhancements. Both emails identified a list of crosswalk locations along Grand Avenue from where the pedestrians were struck to the entrance to Children's Fairyland for our consideration. I would like to report that we are in the process of reviewing these locations

along with all other crosswalk locations on the Grand and Lakeshore corridors for potential improvements. Some of you have expressed an interest in convening a meeting to discuss pedestrian safety and access on these streets. We are available to meet with you and discuss our preliminary findings, and hear your thoughts, opinions and ideas for improvements. I've spoken with Council member McElhaney and Kernighan's office and they have both expressed interest in participating in such a meeting. We will coordinate with both their offices and schedule a meeting to discuss pedestrian safety. Please stay tuned, and we will be in touch. Thank you again for your concerns and making Oakland better and safer for all our roadway users.
